### March Part 3 of the *Birds in Art Series*

**April** Every April our program focuses on the research of the annual Richard Bischoff Scholarship winner at New Mexico State University. This year's recipient, Matt Gould, a PhD student in Department of Fish, Wildlife and Conservation Ecology, will present his research on American black bear populations. His talk will touch upon genetic variation in fragmented bear populations of the Intermountain West, Southwest and northern Mexico.

## Local Audubon Offers Graduate Scholarship

The Mesilla Valley Audubon Society (MVAS) is offering a \$500/per semester scholarship to a graduate student in Department of Fishery and Wildlife Sciences, Department of Biology, or Geography Department at NMSU. Applicants must maintain a 3.5 GPA and explain how their research is related to natural resource conservation.

By maintaining a 3.5 GPA during the first semester of the scholarship, the recipient will receive another \$500 for the second semester.

### Mesilla Valley Audubon Society March Field Trip

"Percha" is almost always a great birding spot. In the past, we have seen a leucistic (the inability to produce pigment) Ladder-backed Woodpecker, as well as normally colored Cooper's Hawks, Vermillion Flycatchers, Eastern and Western Bluebirds, Eastern Phoebes, Ash-throated Flycatchers, Common Black Hawks, and various other wonders. We will stop for lunch at either the Arrey Café or Sparky's in Hatch. For more information call Mark Pendleton at (575)635-8711.

Join MVAS for our bird walk at Tellbrook Park on the 3rd Wednesday of every month. Birding will be done from the paved path that winds through the park, with short, optional excursions into the surrounding desert. Meet at 7:45 a.m. at the entrance to Tellbrook Park at 4290 E. Winchester Rd., Las Cruces. The walks last about an hour, but may go longer if there is enough interest.

These walks are appropriate for beginners and you do not need prior experience to fully enjoy them. However, intermediate and advanced birders will also find them rewarding. Dress appropriately for the weather, bring drinking water and especially bring your curiosity and thirst for the outdoors.

### *Frenzy at the Feeder*

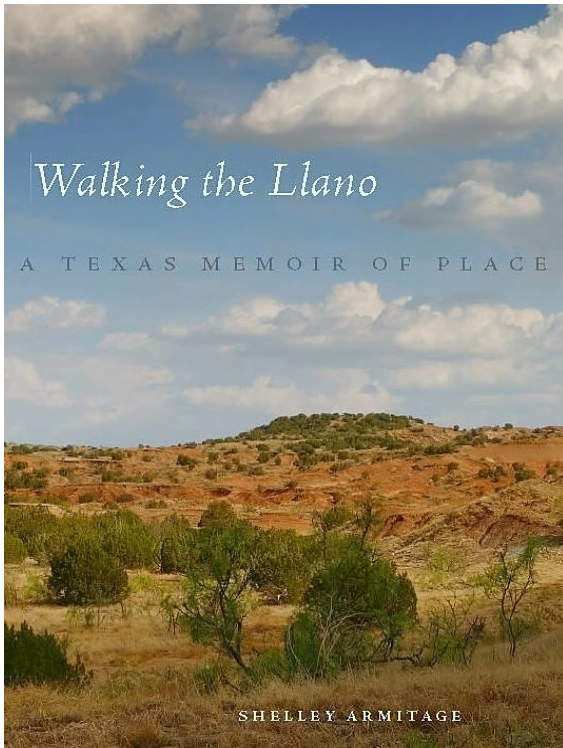
On Saturday, Jan. 23, five intrepid MVAS birders led by Mark Pendleton braved the cold weather and Albuquerque traffic to visit Sandia Crest House in hopes of viewing Rosy-Finches. The balcony of this chalet, with an elevation of two miles, provides both fantastic views of the city and occasional glimpses of bird species that prefer the altitude high and the temperature low.

Feeders can be watched through floor to ceiling balcony windows from the comfort of a small dining area. These feeders attract many montane birds. But the most famous of these without a doubt are the three species of Rosy-Finches. It's a dependable location for finding all three species, which migrate here from different breeding grounds to form mixed flocks in winter. Birders from all over the world also come here to add these three birds to their life lists.

Our MVAS contingent had a great morning. Not only were the Rosy-Finches plentiful, there were also appearances by Mountain Chickadee, Red-breasted Nuthatch, Dark-eyed Junco, Hairy Woodpecker, and Stellar's Jay. All were seen from the comfort of the chalet while sipping coffee and pouring over Sibley.



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## Dr. Shelley Armitage Publishes New Book

MVAS chapter member and Las Cruces resident Dr. Shelley Armitage just published “Walking the Llano: A Texas Memoir of Place,” a lyrical eco-memoir. It is set in the Texas Panhandle connecting prehistoric and historic aspects of the larger Southwest.

Though not a birding book, Dr. Armitage discusses the Llano’s persisting wonders: dynamic mesas and canyons, vast flora and fauna, diverse wildlife and rich human histories as she walks down the Middle Alamosa Creek from her family farm.

Dr. Armitage is professor emerita at the University of Texas at El Paso. She is author of eight books and over 50 articles. She writes widely about the environment as reflected in the arts, literature, and studies of the natural world. Fifty two spotters participated on Dec. 19 in the annual Christmas Bird Count, compared to 48 in 2014. Six participants were feeder observers, vs. 11 a year ago, according to Wayne Teers, CBC coordinator. No nuthatches were seen. Overall, it was an average year for our circle but with a somewhat low species count.

**HIGH COUNTS: 11** (9 of them set new record highs - Mexican Duck, Great Egret, Harris's Hawk, American Kestrel, Eurasian-collared Dove, Red-naped Sapsucker, Ladder-backed Woodpecker, Say's Phoebe and Curve-billed Thrasher)

**LOW COUNTS: 8** (one of them set a new record low - Dark-eyed Oregon Junco; 3 tied for record lows — Ring-billed Gull; Great Horned Owl and Vesper Sparrow).

**TOTAL SPARROWS** (excluding Towhees & House Sparrows): **2,233** (last year: 3,547)

**WHITE-WINGED DOVE: 8,859** (last year: 8,947)

**AMERICAN CROW: 7,039** last year: 9,530)

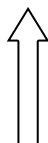
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
